Chapter 17: Dress and Appearance

Men may wear solid white, blue or black suspenders that are not visible under the jacket. (420)

Men will wear low quarter shoes with socks; women will wear pumps with hose. (420)

Approved outer garments and accessories include (420):

- The top coat or all-weather coat
- Black scarf
- Black gloves
- Blue winter cap
- Black earmuffs
- Women may carry handbags

17.9 SERVICE DRESS UNIFORM

The service dress uniform includes the (420-421):

- Blue service coat and trousers/slacks or skirt
- Light blue long- or short-sleeved shirt
- Polyester herringbone twill tie/tie tab

With arms hanging naturally, the sleeves of the service dress coat end 1/4 to 1/2 inch below the wrist, and the bottom edge of the coat extends 3 to 3 1/2 inches below the top of the thigh. (420)

Mandatory accouterments for the service dress coat include (420-421):

- The US lapel insignia
- Nametag
- Ribbons
- Chevrons
- Chaplain, aeronautical, space and cyberspace badges
